Comprehensive Needs Assessment

In order to better meet the needs of students at Saint Jo Elementary School, a comprehensive needs assessment was conducted to determine possible outcomes and solutions to address the findings. Data sources included: STAAR test results, SPED assessment data, DMAC reports, Texas Primary Reading Inventory, TEMI, the Kindergarten Diagnostic Instrument, district demographic reports, attendance reports, parent survey results, SCE/Title 1 information, Texas Academic Performance Reports, and PEIMS data. The findings and recommendations are as follows:

Reading scores for the Saint Jo Elementary campus were at 91% in 2018-2019. STAAR science scores in 2018-2019 were 100% for 5th grade. STAAR math scores in 2018-2019 were at 87%. The state average was 77%. In the 2018-2019 school year, writing was the lowest subject area score at 60%. White students continue to not meet the Met Target requirement for Closing the Gaps. Saint Jo Elementary School had higher STAAR test scores than the state average in Reading, Math, and Science. 24% of elementary students received Masters Grade Level Standard in Reading, the state average is 23%. 31% of elementary students meeting the MEETS grade level dropped last year, although, the APPROACHES grade level percentages remain steady. Saint Jo Elementary earned Distinction Designations in Reading, Math, and Science.

Mrs. Knight assessed all Kindergarten students within the first 20 days of school with the TX-KEA (Texas Kindergarten Entry Assessment). In the 2020-2021 school year, TPRI scores were lower in all grade levels Kindergarten-2nd grade. We believe this overall drop is due to students being out of school since March 2020 due to COVID-19. There were no students on our campus scheduled to take TELPAS this year; however, due to COVID-19 school closures, TELPAS was not given at all across the state. STAAR Alternate 2 was not administered due to the COVID-19 school closure. Mrs. Flusche, Mrs. Hofbauer, and Ms. Melton administered the CIRCLE assessment to all students in PPCD, 3K, Pre-K at the beginning and middle of the year. School closures prevented them from administering the end of year assessments. The TEMI was given to all students in Kindergarten, 1st grade, and 2nd grade at the beginning and middle of the year. The end of year assessments could not be administered due to the COVID-19 school closure. STAR Math and STAR Reading assessments were given to all students each six weeks to measure growth in state standards.

The Pre-K class had an attendance rate of 95.01% which is slightly up from 94.81% last year. Saint Jo Elementary had a mobility rate of 17.1 in the 2018-2019 school year. That is an increase from last year which was 13.3%.

We do have one student that is currently being monitored. Saint Jo Elementary has no dropouts. Saint Jo Elementary has an at-risk rate of 21.6% that is up from last year. Saint Jo Elementary is 52.51 % economically disadvantaged which is down from 53.8% last year. Saint Jo Elementary is 13.8% Special education which is down from 14.7% last year.
